

Objective: The child can recognize the letter B.

Materials needed:

Balls (about 5: different sizes if possible)

White paper and Marker

Finger paint and/or Stickers

Procedures:

- 1. On a white sheet of paper, write the letter Bb, and the sentence at the bottom of the sheet, "B is for ball." Show your child the letter B.
- 2. Tell them, "This is the letter B. B says buh." Have them repeat same phrase. "B-buh"
- 3. Show your child a real ball.
- 4. Ask them: What is this? What does it begin with? Say: "It begins with the letter B; buh is for ball." Now clap the word "ball." Count the syllables in the word (there is 1).
- 5. Read the sentence on the bottom of the sheet.
- 6. On the back of the sheet write the word BALL in the middle. Spell the word "ball" pointing to each letter. Count the letters in the word ball.



- 6. Giving them either finger paint or stickers, let them be creative on the letter B sheet.
- 7. Help their Physical Development: Go outside and play a game of ball with your child. Kick, toss, roll, throw, bounce, and catch.
- 8. <u>Turn it into a Math Lesson:</u> Using the different sizes or types of balls you have at home, sort and categorize the balls with your child. Have them sort by big/small or dependent on the type of sport the ball is used for typically.

Milestones to meet:

The child begins to recognize Bb and begins to associate objects to a word/ beginning letter sound. The child can say the letter and sound. The child uses fine-motor skills to peel stickers and/or paint.

Evaluation:

Did this lesson work for your child? Why or why not?
