



Tape Letters

Ages 1 year - 2 years

Objective: The child is introduced to the letters in their name after peeling them up.

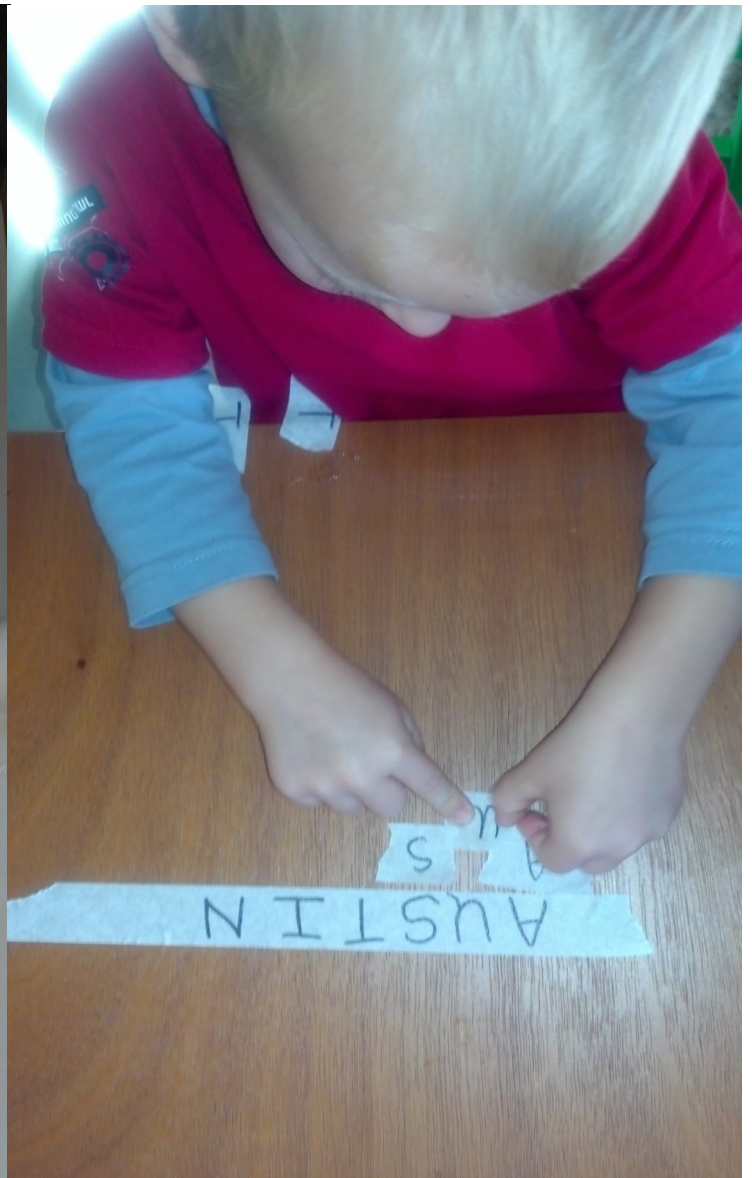
Materials needed:

Scotch tape

Black Sharpie marker (you will use only)

Procedures:

1. On a small squared piece of scotch tape, using a black sharpie marker, write the letter A. Do the same for letter B, C, D, & E OR do the letters in your child's name only.
2. View picture examples on next page.
3. Hand your child each letter-tape one at a time. Show them how to stick it on the high chair tray or carpeted area. **Tip:** Carpet is easier for younger infants to pull tape up from than the high chair tray.
4. If you are doing the letters in your child's name only, put the letters in order from left to right, spelling it out for them.





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5. Encourage child to pull each letter up off of the table or carpet. As they do so, cheer and say that letter to them. Such as: "YAY! You pulled up the letter Aa!" Do this until all letters have been pulled up.

Milestones to meet:

The child is introduced to letters. The child can use fine-motor skills to peel up pieces of tape. The child learns to recognize the letters in their name.

Evaluation:

Did this lesson work for your child? Why or why not?
