


Objective: The child begins to recognize that letters are symbols for something, and shows willingness to say letters by name after seen and heard.

Materials needed:

Scotch Tape Black sharpie marker (you will use only) White sheet of paper

Procedures:

- 1. Using scotch tape, write the alphabet letters ABC individually out on a single piece of tape with the black marker. (see picture example on next page)
- 2. Around one, or two, rooms in your house, place the ABC tape pieces around the walls, furniture, or floor. This is like a "scavenger hunt game."
- 3. While encouraging your child, start going on a "hunt" to look for the letters with them.



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- 5. When you find a letter, showing excitement, say the letter to your child and the sound it makes.
- 6. Ask your child to say the letter with you. ("Can you say <u>A</u>?")
- 7. Continue until all letters have been found or your child no longer shows any interest.
- 8. At the end, help your child try to match and stick the ABC tape pieces to those you have written out on the sheet of white paper. (see picture example on previous page).

Milestones to meet:

The child is introduced to letters. They show interest in "looking for letters." The child shows willingness to try and repeat a letter by name after heard and seen. The child begins to learn matching.

Evaluation:

Did this lesson work for your child? Why or why not?
