

Objective: The child demonstrates creative thought by using their words to tell their own story and draw a picture to illustrate it.

Materials needed:

White paper Crayons or Markers

Procedures:

- 1. Model to show/teach your child what it is you want them to do for this activity. You begin by telling them a short, made-up story. Then, using the paper and crayons, draw a picture of the story you just told them.
- 2. Now let them do. Ask them: "Can you tell me a story? It can be about anything you want.
 Bugs, princesses, your favorite toy, dinosaurs, castles, anything. After you tell me a story, you get to draw me a picture of it."
- 3. Let them tell their own story. You may need to help generate their thoughts by providing



your child some "story starter" type of ideas. Such as: "Once upon a time there was a big castle. In the castle lived a ___(let child finish story)____." OR "One day, there was a boy named Bob. He loved dinosaurs. He went with his family to visit a museum and he saw ___(let child finish story)____."

4. After your child is finished telling you a story they have made-up, give them the white paper and colors and let them draw you a picture of their story.

5. Write their name and date, then at dinner have your child show the picture to dad (or mom) and retell the story again!

Milestones to meet:

The child can use creative thinking and their words to tell you a story and draw a picture about it.

Evaluation:

Did this lesson work for your child? Why or why not?
