

Objective: The child is introduced to words that are associated with summer and uses fine-motor skills to color on a window.

Materials needed:

Large low window (or you can use a mirror) Window markers/crayons (you can find these at any Wal-Mart, Toys'R'Us, or Target in the craft/art section)

Wet paper towels (for cleaning and wiping)

Procedures:

- 1. Sit with your child at a low window.
- 2. Start writing your child's name on the window/mirror. Say and spell each letter to your child as you write it.
- 3. Wipe it off and do another word.
- 4. Summer words you can write to say, teach, and show your child may include: Sun, Ball, Water, Pool, Hot, Swim, Beach, Shell
 **Make sure as you teach words, say each letter to child as you write it, then have child repeat.



- 5. Continue to write words on the window to teach child literacy skills.
- 6. You can encourage your child to try to scribble on the window or mirror by placing the window marker in their hand, helping them as necessary to make stroke-like movements to scribble color on it. Encourage child to color on their own.

Milestones to meet:

The child can listen to words being spoken and tries to repeat letters and/or words. The infant can build their language capacity of unknown words and print-awareness. The infant builds fine-motor skills and grasping abilities to hold a marker and color with it making strokes.

Evaluation:

Did this lesson work for your child? Why or why not?
