

St. Patrick's Day

Clover Petals	At the dollar store or any craft store, they should have four-leaf clover paper cutouts at this time of the year. Have your child use these for arts and crafts gluing glitter to them, or you can use these for counting practice with your child.
Green Finger Paint	Using green baby food (green beans or peas), have your infant or toddler finger paint on their highchair tray just for fun, or a printout of a clover!
Lucky Charms Cereal	You can use these for multiple of activities. Put a handful on a plate and help your child sort the marshmallows into same categorical groups. You can also have your child glue the cereal pieces on a printout of a four-leaf clover just for art fun!
Green Color Hunt	Find any objects, foods, or materials around the house that are green. Go on a “green color hunt” with your child. Good luck!
Counting Coins	Get any loose change you have around the house—pennies, nickels, dimes, and quarters—sit on the floor with your child and help them understand what each of the coins names are, how much they are worth, then help your child count and sort the coins into same groups.
Green Snack Time	With your child, have them help you make green Kool-Aid to drink. Then, you can make green jello and teach math skills to your toddler or preschooler while they help you make it!
Clover Prints	Using potatoes, cut them in half. On the cut side (white inside of potato) using a knife, carve a clover shape into it, about 1/2 inch deep, making a stamp. Put some green washable paint on a paper plate. On white paper, let your child dip the flat-end (clover shaped stamp) of the potato into the paint and on the paper, making clover paint prints! Hands-on learning and fun for any child!
